Policy Context

 The Strategy for the Delivery of Youth Work in Northern Ireland (2005-2008) has brought participation to the forefront in youth work as one of four strategic themes.

Aim 2 of the strategy sets out to "ensure that young people have the skills, knowledge and opportunities to make informed choices about their lives, are at the heart of designing, managing and evaluating youth work policy and practice, have opportunities to address issues they are interested in, and can make a meaningful contribution within their communities and within public and political decision making processes".

Section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act - 1998

Children & Young Peoples 10 Year Strategy

• The inclusion of the following pledge in the Children and Young People's Strategy (Northern Ireland) has brought the interest in participation into an even wider arena. "In accordance with the UN convention on the Rights of the Child, we will be proactive in obtaining the views of children on matters of significance to them". In addition, the strategy states "For the life of the strategy and beyond, we will, therefore, ensure that children and young people are routinely involved in the public decisionmaking process".

Policy cont.....

- The United Kingdom ratified the United Nations
 Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) in 1991.
 Article 12 emphasises young people's rights to have a say in decisions that affect their lives.
- The principal aim of the Northern Ireland Commissioner for Children and Young People (NICCY) is described in the legislation as "to safeguard and promote the rights and best interests of children and young persons".

Youth Forum's Work

- The NIYF is a youth led organisation that lobbies, advocates, promotes and fights for the rights of young people in NI. We aim to build the confidence and awareness of all young people so that they can assert their rights.
