### Sch. Meal Uptakes

- Targets set 5 Year ago circa 10%
- Significant investment in service.
- Regional averages over 1<sup>st</sup> 4 yrs fell
- Last year (07 08) (08 09):

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- All Meals 41.7% 44.3%
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Free Meals 71.7% 74.8%

– Paid Meals 36.5% 36.8%

### What have they told us?

#### Health Outcomes

- High School meal take-up can be linked to Health outcomes
- Clearer evidence likely to emerge from longer term initiatives – they have to be maintained (Hull to Finland!)
- Less evidence that 'price' the only driver on meal take-up



#### Other 'Drivers'

#### Social Policy

- Affordability for parents
  - Poorest families less likely to eat healthily
- Changing wider eating habits education

#### National Policy

- FSM for P1 3 in Scotland
- FSM Pilot Scheme 2 LAs in England
- Extended Criteria Scheme England



#### Cost

#### Universal FSM Schemes

- Loss of paid meal income
- Cost of additional meals varies with take up:
  - Scotland: £1.79 to £4.65
- Capital Costs Kitchen and Dining Environments
- School Costs Lunchtime Supervision and timetabling.

## Operational & Capital Budget Projections



%age Take-up	79%	70%	60%
Loss of Paid Income	£2,686,669	£2,686,669	£2,686,669
Cost of Additional Meals	£3,232,499	£2,285,119	£1,197,009
Total Annual Cost (1 <sup>ST</sup> Yr)	£5,919,168	£4,971,868	£3,883,678
Ave. cost of each additional meal	£3.02	£3.59	£5.35
Capital Cost Projection	Conservative estimate £530,000. (Could be substantially higher.)		



#### Cost v benefit?

- Other options
  - Free Breakfast Paid Lunch (Wales)
  - Short 'Stand Alone' Scheme?
  - Target Age groups (Scotland)
  - Extended FSM criteria (Wolves)
  - Higher subsidy (reduced price)?
- All have point for and against
  - 'Evidence' of outcomes difficult in short term
  - Should be reviewed against other barriers to increased take-up.
