

What is the 'Big Society'?

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Public Sector Reform: 'what can the state do for you'?

- Promote localism and decentralisation: transfer of power, financial autonomy
- From a 'provider' to an 'enabler': diversity in provision, creation and expansion of co-ops, mutuals, social enterprises

Community Empowerment: 'what can we do for ourselves'?

- Active citizens involved in social action and public service delivery; not just 'having a say' but also 'doing'
- Encourage volunteering, train community organisers, support the creation of neighbourhood groups

Philanthropy: 'what can we do for others'

• Encourage charitable giving, reciprocity

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Towards the 'Big Society'



We want to make sure people can take control and take responsibility in their street, their estate, their town. Solving problems and taking action for themselves. With neighbourhoods, people working together, as the basis for the Big Society'

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Resourcing the 'Big Society'



- New Labour era for all its faults may look luxurious from the standpoint of 'radical localist austerity'
- With a priority of deficit reduction, is localism only shifting the blame for cuts?
- Achievement of the 'Big Society' may increase demands on the state in disadvantaged areas rather than reducing its role
- Community action takes time to develop and needs ongoing support from the state
- With little resourcing available at the local level, can the Big Society work?



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Interest in the 'Big Society'



- Is there an appetite for 'Big Society'?
- 'Big Society' seems targeted as particular communities
- Some communities are more ready than others for the Big Society.
- Concerns about strategy, sustainability, capacity, lack of inclusivity



Fragmentation of the public sector



- Public service provision to be divested to social enterprises, co-ops and mutuals
- But lack of resources for experimentation
- Questions about potential scale and sustainability of these divestments
- · Potential for divestment disasters?
- Many of these proposed reforms of the public sector could become 'staging posts' to the marketisation of public services



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Impact on equality



- · Coalition are 'intensely relaxed' about inequality
- Radical break from New Labour 'paranoia' about postcode lottery
- But also from targeted interventions in disadvantaged communities aiming to 'narrow the gap'
- Is a pertinent question, which communities win and which lose?
- · Prospect of widening inequalities



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Leading the 'Big Society': the challenge for local government



- Need to avoid defensive short-termist reaction from local government.
- Instead, a strategic response from local government is required.
- · Role for local government in place stewardship
