Periodic Inspection Report - Purpose

- Safety of persons or livestock against effects of electric shock and burns
- Protection against damage to property by fire or heat due to an installation defect
- Confirmation that the installation is not damaged or deteriorated so as to impair safety
- The identification of the installation's defects and non-compliance with the requirements of the regulations which may give rise to danger





Public awareness

- In March 2006 the Electrical Safety Council published the results of their National Consumer Survey and found that:
- 42% of consumers had never had their electrics checked
- 32% of consumers who do DIY had experienced one or more electric shocks while carrying out DIY
- 59% of people do not use qualified electricians when carrying out electrical work
- 35% of consumers said their electrics are over 15 years old and a further 21% had no idea how old they were
- 48% of those surveyed did not know that their electrics should be checked at least every 10 years





Risks of not doing it are high

- In the UK in 2005, electrics were the cause of
 - 17 out of every 100 domestic fires
 - 5 out of every 100 deaths from domestic fires
 - 11 out of every 100 injuries from domestic fires
- For every 100 electrical fires
 - 48 were due to electrical appliances
 - 33 were due to electrical distribution
 - 19 were due to cooking or heating appliances
- In 2002, there were 2809 accidents caused by exposure to electrical current in the home, including 21 deaths





Statutory Legislation

- Electricity at work regulations
 - Regulation 3 (1) except where otherwise expressly provided in these regulations, it shall be the duty of every (a) employer and self employed person to comply with the provision of these regulations in so far as they relate to matters which are within his control.
 - Regulation 4 (1) all systems shall at all times be of such construction as to prevent, so far as is reasonable practicable, danger
 - Regulation 4 (2) as may be necessary to prevent danger, all systems shall be maintained so as to prevent, so far as is reasonably practicable, such danger.





Statutory Legislation (continued)

- The Housing (Scotland) Act 2006
 - Section 13, sub-section (1)(c) the repairing standard and
 - Section 14 Landlords duty to repair and maintain
 - From 3.9.07 the Tolerable Standard has been extended. Electrical wiring, components and fittings must be adequate and safe to use.
