Introduction

- 3-year project, funded primarily by the Welsh Assembly Government (*LEQ department*)
- 'Tidy Towns' has 2 WAG elements; *KWT (£1mill) and Local Authorities (£3mill) per annum*
- KWT are delivering the community engagement element
- Budget of £4.3 million over 3 years
- Will improve the quality of the local environment through community action across Wales



KWT Aim and Objectives

- To support the people of Wales to take responsibility for their local environment
- To support community group action to clean and maintain the cleanliness of Wales
- To support community groups to undertake environmental improvement work eg access, biodiversity
- To provide training for volunteers







What will Tidy Towns do?

Employ dedicated community officers throughout Wales who will:

- engage community groups, businesses, disengaged vols;
- work with local authorities;
- community clean-ups and environmental improvements;

- 577 groups assisted (ave = 48 per month)

- 3402 clean-ups undertaken by volunteers
- £86,886 of small grants issued to groups

- Increase in urban activity
- New types of projects

eg allotments, graffitti removal, outdoor classrooms
